Kia ora e te whānau

Well done to our Year 7 and 8 kapa haka students who performed at the Tātarakihi kapa haka festival. Students displayed all three of our school values, Aotea, Taupaenui and Paepae in preparing for this performance as well as on the day. It was great to see you excited and proud to perform alongside 31 other schools that day. We enjoyed watching your performance and the positive response you gained from the crowd.

Practice examinations are now complete. Congratulations to our senior students who prepared themselves thoroughly for these examinations. The exam supervisors have said that the behaviour of our students sitting these examinations was flawless and it was obvious that most of our students took these examinations very seriously. All senior students should now turn their attention to completing their internal assessments and studying for the end of year examinations. Students should be making use of the extra afterschool classes right up until examination time. Senior examinations were held in Jubilee Gym, so a huge thank you to our junior students for being respectful around these areas during break times over the last week.

Thank you to all parents who attended meetings with whānau teachers this week. Junior students should have carefully selected modules for Term 4 now to ensure they have covered all aspects of the curriculum over the year. Our Year 10-12 students should have chosen their subjects for 2024. If you have any questions or your child needs further careers guidance, please come and see us.

As always in our newsletter, we have provided a summary of our NCEA results to date. Predictions at all three year levels have improved in the last two weeks with Level 1 and 3 having a predicted pass rate over 90%. It is also pleasing to see the number of Merit and Excellence grades on the system. We are looking forward to seeing many of our students gain course and subject endorsements.

Last newsletter we shared information on the New Zealand Curriculum refresh. We have added this information again this week. I encourage you to have a look at this information to gain a greater understanding of the curriculum changes happening nationwide.

Enrolments for 2024 are underway. We have completed all visits to our feeder schools bar one. The last visit is on the calendar for the start of Term 4. It is helpful for our planning if students enrol for 2024 as soon as practicable. In Term 4 we will be hosting each of the students from our feeder schools for two days. These two days will give studentstransitioning to Te Paepae o Aotea an opportunity to experience a day in the life and learn more about how and what they will be learning in 2024.

Prizegiving dates have been set. Please add these to your calendars. We would love to have members of our community join us to celebrate the success of our students. At our prizegivings, students will

be acknowledged for displaying our school values. Each prizegiving will be split into three sections: Aotea, Taupaenui and Paepae. This year we will have three prizegivings — Years 7 and 8 combined, Years 9 and 10 combined and Years 11-13 combined.

Lastly, thank you to everyone that joined us for our end of term whole school assembly. It was great to celebrate another successful and enjoyable school term.

Senior School Study Plan

With exams starting soon, it is important that your child starts a good revision programme if they have not done so already. From what I have seen in the exams, some students could well benefit from it.

Parents, you can support your child in the following way:

- Work with your child to develop a study plan so that everyone knows what is happening. This is a good planner to start with – <u>study planner</u>
- It's also important to choose the right environment for your study. It's recommended you find a quiet, airy, well-lit place with no distractions. 'Distractions' include your cell phone and social media (put these in another room while you are studying). While you might need to use the internet to help your study, turn off notifications whenever possible.
- Take good notes and save any handouts from your teacher.
- Go to any and all revision sessions offered by the school/your teacher.
- Attempt previous years exams.
- Take regular breaks.
- Utilise websites that will help you study:


