Kia ora e te whānau

Term 4 is going to be an exciting term as our students complete their learning programmes for the year and we celebrate the success of our students. Our senior students will be finishing on 1 November with their formal prizegiving on 3 November.

Our senior prizegiving will be to celebrate the achievements of our Year 11 – 13 students. Everyone is welcome to join us upstairs in the Hub at 6.30pm. Our junior prizegivings will be held later in the year on 15 December. All our prizegivings are formal events and students should be in correct school uniform.

There are three main categories of awards: Aotea, Taupaenui and Paepae. For further information, please see the prizegiving breakdown at the end of this newsletter.

Organising our prizegivings for the first time has been exciting. It has given us an opportunity to reflect on our school values, the aspirations of our students and their whānau, and the aspirations we have for them. It has been an opportunity for us to talk about forming new traditions, ensuring we reward students in keeping with our school values formed from the aspirations collected from our community during the consultation phase of designing our school.

We are busy having custom trophies made for our major awards. We have decided not to purchase the remainder of the trophies this year as we know there will be people in our community who wish to donate trophies and have them named after family members. If you would like to donate a trophy for one of the awards listed in the prizegiving breakdown sheet, please contact the office to take you through the process.

Senior students have now received the results of their practice examinations and should be using the feedback from these examinations to prepare for their external NCEA examinations. All senior students should have a study plan and have recorded on their calendar the dates and times of their examinations. They should also have checked that they can log-in to the NZQA website to access their results in the new year.

All Year 11 and 12 students should have chosen their courses for 2024. If they haven't, they need to urgently connect with their whānau teacher.

Junior students have started their Term 4 modules and like the previous two terms, parents will receive reports sent via email at the end of the year. Year 10 students should have chosen their courses for next year and if they haven't, they need to connect with their whānau teacher. If further guidance is required from the careers department, please contact the office to set up an appointment.

Our Year 9 and 10 students also have the opportunity this month to sit the new literacy and numeracy standards as part of their NCEA journey. We wish them well and know that they will endeavour to put their best foot forward. If students pass, they can tick off numeracy and/or literacy. These students can then extend themselves in literacy and numeracy at Curriculum Level 6 and beyond (NCEA Level 1 is set at Curriculum Level 6). If they are not yet able to pass, there will be further opportunities in 2024.

As always in our newsletter, we have provided a summary of our NCEA results to date. Predictions at all three-year levels have improved since our last newsletter with Level 1 and 3 having a predicted pass rate over 90%. It is also pleasing to see the number of Merit and Excellence grades on the system. We are looking forward to seeing many of our students gain course and subject endorsements.

Our junior students have activity week from 11 – 14 December. Students will be in their whānau classes doing a variety of activities. Some activities will be offsite and we will share this information closer to the time. All learning programmes (e.g., Flexitime, Community Contribution and Integrated Learning Modules) for junior students will finish at the end of the previous week. Market days will be Thursday and Friday, 7 and 8 December.

Enrolments for 2024 are underway. This term we welcome transition visits for prospective Year 7 and 9 students. Our current Year 10 students will be spending their Monday morning time ensuring they are prepared to transition from the junior school to the senior school. Transition visits will begin from week 6 onwards, once senior students begin study leave.

Every Wednesday night in November we will hold open evenings for potential student and parent visits to the school. They can complete enrolments and ask questions of our staff. We look forward to hosting many of you.

Thank you to everyone who has enrolled their child for 2024. Having students enrolled early certainly helps with our planning. Please encourage all those that have not yet enrolled to contact us.

Thank you all for your continued support of the school. We have a massive term ahead and we look forward to sharing these experiences with you.

Parents, you can support your child in the following way:

- Work with your child to develop a study plan so that everyone knows what is happening. This is a good planner to start with – [study planner](#)
- It's also important to choose the right environment for your study. It's recommended you find a quiet, airy, well-lit place with no distractions. 'Distractions' include your cell phone and social media (put these in another room while you are studying). While you might need to use the internet to help your study, turn off notifications whenever possible.
- Take good notes and save any handouts from your teacher.
- Go to any and all revision sessions offered by the school/your teacher.
- Attempt previous years exams.
- Take regular breaks.

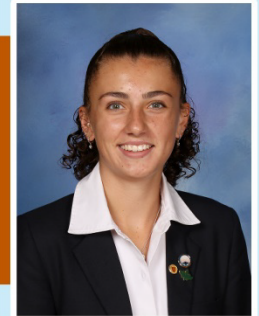

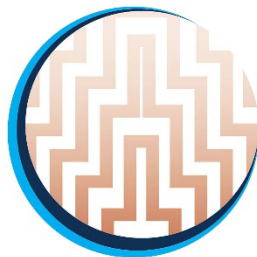

MEASLES INFORMATION

Recently an alert went out across New Zealand when a Northland student was diagnosed with measles after attending a National Shakespeare Schools event in Wellington during the school holidays.

Te Whatu Ora Taranaki is reminding everyone to be vigilant following this case and keep an eye out for the signs and symptoms of measles which is a serious viral disease that can make people very sick. It spreads very easily among people who have not had measles before or have not been immunised against measles. It can be passed on by breathing, sneezing, or coughing near others. You can catch measles just by being in a room someone with measles was in up to an hour before.

Where measles is suspected, please stay at home, and call your healthcare provider or Healthline on 0800 611 116 for more advice.

The best way to ensure you and your family/whānau are protected from measles is to be up to date with the measles immunisation (MMR).

If you aren't sure whether you have had one or two doses of MMR, for most people it's safe to get vaccinated again – just reach out to your health provider or visit your local pharmacy.




Measles signs and symptoms

- It usually takes 10-12 days from exposure to the first symptom.
- The illness begins with fever, cough, runny nose, and conjunctivitis (inflammation in the eyes), which lasts for 2-4 days.
- It may be possible to see small white spots (Koplik spots) inside the mouth.
- A rash appears 2-4 days after the first symptoms, beginning at the hairline and gradually spreading down the body to the arms and legs. The rash can last for up to one week.
