# Newsletter - 24 November 2023

Kia ora e te whānau

Term four is always a time to enjoy the warmer weather (at times), to reflect on the year and start to make plans for the upcoming year. Our senior students and our soon to be seniors (Year 10's) have selected their courses for 2024 and it is now time for our new students and current junior students to select their courses. The junior course booklet will be emailed to parents on Monday with students getting their own copy in class. The course booklet has links for students to make their choices. If you have any questions, please connect with your child's whānau teacher or if you are a new student, connect with the school office.

In 2024, Year 7-10 students can choose to be part of a Kaupapa Māori based Whānau and Foundations Class at Te Paepae o Aotea. More information on this exciting new programme can be found later in the newsletter.

Our last week of the year is our much-anticipated activity week culminating with our prizegivings on 15 December. Please keep an eye out for the schedule as we would love for you to join us at our awa assemblies and junior prizegivings to celebrate the successes our students have had this year. Further details about activity week and prizegivings can be found further down in this newsletter.

Our senior students have been focused on their NCEA external examinations; these will finish on 29 November. I would like to commend the senior students who have taken time to access valuable extra tuition from our expert teachers prior to their examinations. Results will be released by NZQA in mid-January and all senior students should check that they can login to the NZQA site. If students are having difficulties logging into NZQA, they should ring 0800 697 296 or use their online portal for assistance. We have had several senior students make use of their time during study leave to complete internal assessment. It has been great to see them focused so that they gain their qualification. All senior students should return their school allocated device to the main office as soon as they have sat their last exam or completed their last internal assessment. All devices must be in before 14 December. Families will be charged for any devices not returned.

Our team has been enjoying our transition visits with the Year 6 and 8 students from our feeder schools. We have one last day on Monday for Tawhiti School followed by one last open evening next Wednesday. We are hopeful that the new students have enjoyed their visits and are feeling confident about starting at Te Paepae o Aotea next year. If you are yet to enrol or know someone who is, please encourage them to do so as soon as possible. If you need any assistance enrolling, please connect with us. We are happy to help.

We have also been focused on transitioning our Year 10 students to the senior school. The Year 10 students have been working on Monday mornings with senior whānau teachers understanding the NCEA system and the expectations of being a senior student. I feel confident that our Year 10 students are ready to make the transition to the senior school as 58 of our Year 10 students already have NCEA credits on the system. Most of the Year 10's (unless they were absent) have all sat the Common Assessment Activities (CAA) for literacy and numeracy. These results will be available over the Christmas break. If students passed both literacy and numeracy, they will have gained 20 credits toward their NCEA Level 1 qualification.

Throughout the year it is important that our students spend time on the health aspect of the New Zealand Curriculum. In the last few weeks our Year 7 and 8 students have had Harold from the Life Education Trust visit as well as completing their first aid training. Thank you to Life Education Trust and St Johns for providing your expertise in these areas. Our Year 10 students have had sessions delivered by a registered health nurse in the last two weeks with a focus around healthy relationships. Our Year 9 students will have an opportunity to start working through their healthy relationship programme next week. It is great to be able to offer these important programmes to our students with the support of external agencies.

Currently our junior volleyball team is away at nationals in Auckland. They are representing the school with pride. Thank you to the coaches and manager that are guiding our team on this journey. We are looking forward to hearing all the amazing stories about your experiences.

Thank you all for your continued support of our students and we are looking forward to you joining us for our end of year awa assemblies and prizegivings.

## Kaupapa Māori based Whānau and Foundations Class

E ngā mana, e ngā reo e ngā rau rangatira mā, kei te mihi ki a koutou,

In 2024, Year 7-10 students can choose to be part of a Kaupapa Māori based Whānau and Foundations class at Te Paepae o Aotea. This class offers an alternative morning programme (daily from 9-11am) for those students and whānau that would like to be part of it. Depending on ability and demand, we will utilise our whānau time to meet as a rōpu, practise karakia, mōteatea and waiata and deliver the social and emotional curriculum through our uara Māori.

In Foundations, students will study English and Math skills through the learning of Te Reo Māori and through learning in Kaupapa Māori contexts. Whether these classes are reo rua (bilingual) or reo rūmaki (total immersion) will be determined by the ability and demand of our students. If there is a demand for this kaupapa amongst our senior students, we will offer them a similar opportunity through their Taupaenui time (Wednesdays, Block two and three) where they will be able to receive some of their NCEA credits through various Kaupapa Māori drawn from the curriculum.

Senior students need to indicate their interest to our Senior Pastoral Lead, Mahaki Akauola, as soon as possible. <u>Mahaki.Akauola@tepaepaeoaotea.school.nz</u>

Nō reira, we will be running two Open Evenings on Tuesday 5th and Thursday 7th December in Week 9 for students and whānau to come and discuss this opportunity further. On Wednesday, 6 December, we will also offer an Open Day (9-11am) where students and whānau can come and see what a morning might look like for those within this kaupapa.



# The following items will be available for purchase from NZ Uniforms

- Blue jacket with school logo.
- Blue hoodies with school logo.
- Polo shirt with school logo.
- School navy blue shorts, culottes, skirt or long pants.
- Orange dress shirts and blazers are optional for senior students. (Senior students who do not want this option will wear the Polo shirt, hoodie etc)
- A variety of other items will also be available: hats/caps, beanies and ties.

## **Other uniform information**

- Plain black school shoes/sandals.
- Plain black/navy or white socks.
- There is no specific PE uniform students to change into comfortable activewear.
- Sports uniforms will be provided by the school.
- Pre-owned interim uniform can be worn until the end of 2025.
- The old uniform will no longer be available for purchase.

# Te Paepae o Aotea School Uniform

It is expected that the new Te Paepae o Aotea school uniform will be worn in 2024. The current polo shirts and hoodies can be worn until the end of 2025.

### FAQs

- 1. What is the junior school uniform?
  - Te Paepae o Aotea polo shirt, hoodie and/or soft-shell jacket, skirt, shorts, culottes or long pants.
- 2. Which year levels can wear the formal school uniform?
  - Year 11, 12 and 13 students can wear the formal school uniform daily.
- 3. What is the formal school uniform?
  - The formal school uniform consists of a long sleeve or short sleeve shirt, blazer or softshell jacket and skirt or long pants. The school tie is optional. The school will hold a set of blazers and ties to lend to students if they are attending a formal occasion.
- 4. Can senior students continue to wear a polo shirt and hoodie?
  - Yes.
- 5. Can students wear the hoodies and polo shirts provided free of charge when Te Paepae o Aotea opened?
  - Yes, up until the end of 2025 but new lower garments must be purchased for 2024.
- 6. Do I need to buy my child new lower garments for the start of 2024?
  - Yes, all lower garments must be Te Paepae o Aotea school uniform with the logo label unless the lower garments you have already purchased are navy blue **school wear** garments. Black lower garments are not acceptable in 2024.
- 7. What footwear and socks are Te Paepae o Aotea school uniform?
  - Black lace up school shoes or black sandals with a back strap. Plain black/white or navy blue socks, black tights.
- 8. Do students have a PE uniform?
  - No, but students must change into comfortable sports clothing.
- 9. Are uniform sun hats, beanies and a warm scarf available for purchase?
  - Yes, there is a Te Paepae o Aotea uniform bucket hat, cap, beanie and warm scarf.
- 10. Where can I buy the Te Paepae o Aotea school uniform?
  - A pop-up shop will open at school, 15-18 January. The school shirt is unlikely to be available until the end of February 2024, but alternative shirts can be tried on for size at the pop-up shop and the correct shirts will be sent when they are ready.
