The tuakana–teina relationship, an integral part of traditional Māori society, provides a model for buddy systems. An older or more expert tuakana (brother, sister or cousin) helps and guides a younger or less expert teina (originally a younger sibling or cousin). In a learning environment that recognises the value of ako, the tuakana–teina roles may be reversed at any time. For example, the student who yesterday was the expert on te wā and explained the lunar calendar may need to learn from her classmate today about how manaakitanga (hospitality) is practised by the local hapū.

Literacy and Numeracy for Year 9 & 10 classes might be allocated on different days, the above allocation is an example only.

This is our focused non-negotiable Literacy and Numeracy learning time. This is where we explicitly target the key Achievement Objectives of Reading, Writing and Mathematics. Every student participates in 4.5 hours each of explicit literacy and numeracy learning. Assessment tasks consist of a combination of in class snapshots of real time learning, teacher observation and formal nationally moderated assessment tools.

Intergrated Learning Modules:

Integrated Learning Modules (ILMs) create learning experiences that enable students to draw meaningful connections across different curriculum areas and between their learning and real-world applications. It helps them to understand how concepts and skills are linked and can be applied in different situations/ contexts.

Each module will cover at least 2 curriculum areas in addition to **Literacy** and **Numeracy**. ILMs are based on a 'Big Idea' from the New Zealand Curriculum. A students' learning journey is recorded in their e-portfolio.

Students will choose two learning modules which will each run for two 90-minute blocks per week. These modules run for 17 weeks. All curriculum areas must be covered across the modules throughout the school year.

Community Contribution:

This is an opportunity to cover curriculum in a community focused practical way. Students will choose one Community Contribution which will run on Wednesday over the second and third block. These modules will run for 17 weeks. All curriculum areas must be covered throughout the school year. Kapahaka is not currently listed in the courses however it is an option during Community Contribution alongside the senior Taupaenui programme.

Flexi time:

Flexi time is an opportunity for learners to double down on areas of interest or to target a curriculum need. These modules focus on 1 curriculum area in depth. Over the week the students will have two 1hour 15min sessions. They have the opportunity to change Flexi Time each term.

Tracking and Monitoring:

Students have had the opportunity to choose their preferred modules, which has been taken into consideration when selecting the best modules for their timetable. Students must cover all curriculum areas within the year. This means that in some cases students do not get their preferred options and have been placed in classes based on curriculum coverage needs. Whanau teachers along side students are tracking and monitoring the curriculum coverage.

Te Kura

As enrolments in Te Kura (correspondence school) are settling down now so for parents/ caregivers of students involved in online learning through Te Kura you need to know that if your student has any technical difficulties on getting online or any queries then you or they can contact Mr Elgar at school or kai.elgar@tepaepaeoaotea.school.nz for advice, or assistance in sorting out connection issues. Students will be allocated to a Te Kura Team as last year so they can ask questions and receive updated information as provided by Te Kura.

It is the student's responsibility to access their work online regularly, complete the work and use the Dropbox to submit assessable work each calendar month. Failure to do so will result in students being identified as non-returners. If that happens twice then students will be locked out of their account and Te Kura terminates their enrolment in that course. Students will get warning of this. School Holidays for Te Kura don't exist so even if we have school holidays students still must submit assessable work via Dropbox each month.

Senior student will have internal assessments throughout the year when deemed ready by their online teachers. Practice external assessment will take place in late Term 3 or Early Term 4 and may not coincide with school practice exams, but students will get plenty of notice from their online teachers. Results of assessments will be sent to Te Paepae O Aotea and reported via our KAMAR system and students will be able to see them through their login to NZQA.
