The tuakana–teina relationship, an integral part of traditional Māori society, provides a model for buddy systems. An older or more expert tuakana (brother, sister or cousin) helps and guides a younger or less expert teina (originally a younger sibling or cousin). In a learning environment that recognises the value of ako, the tuakana–teina roles may be reversed at any time. For example, the student who yesterday was the expert on te wā and explained the lunar calendar may need to learn from her classmate today about how manaakitanga (hospitality) is practiced by the local hapū.

SPOTLIGHT ON! Beauty

Deanna Gedge owner/operator of deebiza hairstudio and bliss beauty at deebiza hair studio

1. Did you envision yourself in this career?

Absolutely. I have since a very young age. The artistic side and the originality of it really appealed to me.

2. How did you end up in this position?

I was approached by a hairdresser at a Saturday morning netball game who asked if I wanted an apprenticeship. Since this was an industry-based career, it was pay as you learn. Not having to worry about a student loan made this even more attractive to me.

3. What would you say is the hardest part of this career?

It's a lot more technical than a lot of people think. There are many elements for example, permanent straightening, or bleach and tone that are quite difficult to master.

4. What are some benefits of this job?

You get to meet some really nice people, that you likely wouldn't have met outside of this job. You also get really cool outcomes, especially when doing hair for big events like proms, or weddings. It's just lovely to be part of and see your hard work pay off.

5. What would you rate your job?

9.5/10 I'm really lucky. I love what I do which means I enjoy going to work each day. The regulars every week really become part of who you are.

6. What is the range that you could earn in this career? (entry level vs experienced)

The range is around \$45k to 100k per year. There are so many opportunities. It's the type of career, which is needed all around the world, so there are always jobs available.

7.What did the training entail?

I did three years as an apprentice, then spent a few more years on the floor gaining more skills and experience to help further my career.

8. What skills help you in this job?

Good communication and being organised is super important. A high level of professionalism is also required.

9. What is your favourite aspect of this job?

I love doing cuts and colours and long hair up for proms and balls. It's a shame I don't get to do these as often as I would like, but its always very rewarding when I do.

10. In high school, what are some opportunities that could help put people ahead?

I think it would be a great idea to approach a business and offer your services to learn basic skills. Doing programs like Gateway in school is a great way to get some experience.

Here's what you need to know to help teach your child about staying safe on roads and near railways.

Keep it as a handy reference tool.

WALKING

Teach your child about how to be safe when walking alone or with others.

- Go to the roadside near your home and kneel down so you are the same height as your child.
- Ask your child what they can actually see or hear from their point of view.
- Children can't judge traffic and may not be thinking about what they are doing right then like trying to cross the road safely.

Teach your child how to do the following (and explain why they need to):

- Walk on the footpath, close to the houses and away from the road.
- Look and listen for traffic at driveways (some driveways are difficult to see).
- Use pedestrian crossings or cross at traffic signals, wherever possible.
- Take care in car parks, school drop-off/pick-up points or busy shopping areas with lots of traffic.
- Walk facing oncoming traffic on roads where there are no footpaths.
- Share the footpath with others, including skaters, scooters, wheelchairs and mobility scooters.

If there are no crossings or traffic signals, talk about and show your child how to:

- find a safe place to cross
- always use the kerb drill.

KERB DRILL

- 1 Take one step back from the kerb.
- Look and listen for traffic coming from all directions.

3 If there is traffic coming, wait until it has passed and then look and listen for traffic again.

- 4 If there is no traffic coming, walk quickly straight across the road.
- 5 While crossing, look and listen for traffic, wherever it may come from.

BLOCKED FOOTPATHS

Teach your child to watch for vehicles.

If a vehicle is blocking the footpath, show them the following steps:

- Check inside the vehicle to see if there's a driver.
- If you can see a driver, stop a couple of metres away and wait to see if they are going to move.

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- If you can't see a driver, look and listen for signs the vehicle may move soon, for example:
 - exhaust fumes
 - reverse lights
 - engine noise.

If there's no driver in the car and the engine isn't running, walk around the vehicle on the house side.

If there's no room on the house side, walk carefully around on the road side, looking and listening for traffic from all directions. Or go back and find a safe place to cross the road using the kerb drill.

> If there are no crossings or traffic signals, talk about and show your children how to find a safe place to cross.
