Kia ora e te whānau

What an amazing term we have had. We have so much to be grateful for as our students continue to excel across so many different areas of school and community life. We are proud of our students and we hope you are following their progress on our social media platforms. A few highlights of this term have been the inaugural Kapa Haka performance at Pae Rangatahi where we were fourth overall, Ebony Kalin finishing in the top six in the country for her race unity speech, Erina Frearson and Jahzel Potaka both gaining top three places at Manu Korero. Thank you to all our wonderful staff and community members who have helped our students achieve these incredible feats.

Yesterday in assembly I listed all the experiences and opportunities our students had been offered throughout this term. The list was extensive and varied. Our staff and students have done an amazing job staying focused on learning despite the effects of industrial action. I think we are all hopeful next term will have less disruption.

One of our school goals, Taupaenui, challenges us to strive for excellence and reach our full potential. We challenge our students to uphold a learning culture that is inclusive and diverse. We ask that they display a positive attitude and a growth mindset in the pursuit of personal excellence. It is important that our students understand what this value looks like in all spaces in our school and community. Our sports coordinator, Vicki, has published guidelines on what Taupaenui looks like on the sports field. These guidelines can be found later in our newsletter and apply to players, referees, coaches, managers, administrators and spectators. We want all our students to participate and enjoy their sports and for this to happen, we all must play our part.

Our junior students should have received their reports today and hopefully many of you would have been able to meet with their whānau teacher to discuss their learning. I have asked students to reflect on the following questions and discuss them with their whānau and teachers.

- Did I engage enough with my learning?
- Can I learn in different ways?
- Did I work well alongside others?
- Did I manage myself well?
- Did I have a growth mindset?

As always, if you have questions about your student's learning, please contact their whānau or module teacher in the first instance.

All students in our school should be striving for Taupaenui in the classroom and I have been keeping a close on eye on assessment information for seniors and juniors. Today, I want to highlight the work

of our senior students. I am very delighted to report that 85% of our Year 11 students are on track to gain their Level 1 qualification. 80% and 83% of Year 12 and 13 students respectively are also on track to their qualification. I can also report that our senior students are gaining a good amount of Merit and Excellence grades, which means our students are not only passing, but are producing quality work in their chosen subjects.

Attendance remains a focus and we thank every parent that is keeping a close eye on attendance through parent portal. The Ministry of Education has a goal to have at least 70% of students in New Zealand attending school for more than 90% of the time. At this stage, although we have lots of students meeting this target overall, we have room for improvement. Please continue to connect with us so we can work together to overcome any attendance barriers students might have.

Yesterday we were able to celebrate the end of term with the Pacific Lutheran College (PLC) from Queensland. They have been on a music tour of New Zealand. The tour comprised four public concerts including one in Auckland town square and two school workshop days. Our music students joined the PLC students for their workshop day. Both schools collaborated and learnt together throughout the day. The PLC band had been rehearsing all year and our students enjoyed listening to their music. The highlight was the PLC band joining our students to perform pepeha from Six60. Following the performance from PLC our Kapa Haka group performed their complete bracket from Pae Rangatahi. What a performance. It was just as good the second time round and our students in this group should be incredibly proud of their success. Next term our Year 7 and 8 students have an opportunity to compete in their kapa haka competition and we are looking forward to seeing them showcase their talents.

Thank you to our wonderful students and staff for a great term. Have a wonderful break and we are look forward to having you all back again next term to continue our learning journey.






